#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

This is the Department of Psychology's capstone course, designed to foster and evaluate the student's fundamental understanding of psychology as an empirical research science. In this **two-semester course**, students will acquire and utilize the skills necessary for conducting and reporting empirical research in psychology.


Each student will **individually conduct their own one-year long research project** under the supervision from a member of the
Department of Psychology and with the support from the instructor of
this course. We understand that because of the nature of scientific
research, each senior project will differ in terms of its timing and
emphasis on particular aspects of the research process. However,
completion of each part of the senior thesis project will be strictly
controlled based on deadlines. The deadlines will be announced earlier in
the semester.

#### During the Fall semester you will be:

- conducting literature review: finding and reviewing academic literature
- forming hypotheses/formulating main research questions
- designing research to test those hypotheses/to study the problem/issue and find answers to specific research questions

#### **During the Spring semester:**

- data collection must be completed by early spring semester
- you will be analyzing and synthesizing the data,
- writing the thesis, and creating professional presentations
- presenting senior theses at Mock Defense and Final Defense.



#### **COURSE OBJECTIVES**


By the completion of this course the students will be expected to demonstrate the following skills:

- Analyze, synthesize, and evaluate information from primary sources to address psychologically relevant issues.
- Develop and conduct a research project; Write using APA style.
- Communicate orally and in a written form their research plan;
- Conduct and describe their research findings.

#### ORGANIZATION OF THE COURSE

The course will use an **online seminar format**. Students will present their work in relation to their senior project in the format of structured assignment or in less formal discussions. Throughout the course students will carry out **five assignments** completion of which will lead to development of their thesis. Three times during the course, each student will give formal presentations in the presence of all faculty members - **Research Symposium**, **Mock Defense**, **Final Defense**.

The schedule of these meetings as well as the description of the requirements for the presentations will be available early in the semester. Each student is expected to actively participate in the in-class discussions, present their assignments, raise questions for discussions and carefully consider/address to the comments received at the departmental meetings. Each week students must have meetings with their thesis supervisors in order to ensure they are on time with their projects. At least once a month every student needs to have meetings with WARC tutors.




#### "NEW NORMAL"

#### **SEMINAR CLASS POLICIES**

ATTENDANCE: Attendance at zoom sessions for this class is mandatory. The class will be held as per the schedule on a weekly basis (see below class schedule).

IN-CLASS PARTICIPATION: Each class we will have discussion sessions. During these sessions, you will be asked to share your experiences with the process of carrying out your research project. You will be encouraged to raise questions outlining the moments that were not very clear or you would like a second opinion about. You will be expected to listen to other students without interruption and critically reply to other students' comments and questions. Missed or late work will be accepted only if a student provides an official note reasoning a substantive excuse for such circumstances – medical certificate in case of missing classes due to having health issues is required.

#### **ISSUES OF GRADING**

If you feel that the evaluation of your work was not fair or you noticed some scoring mistakes in your grade, you should bring these issues to my attention immediately! If your demands are reasonable, I will remedy my mistakes. After all, social psychological research demonstrates that all people are susceptible to mistakes and biases. I promise, there will be a no-risk situation for you – I will not penalize anyone who takes the time to highlight instances where you or someone else were treated unfairly. In case the grade disputation is not solved at this stage the students can approach **Executive Committee /Academic Appeals Committee**<sup>1</sup> that is responsible for evaluating the evidence provided by both faculty member and the student and make a decision enabling conflict resolution regarding student's academic work.

#### **CHEATING POLICY**

All written assignments, including presentations must include the citation of source materials that were used by the student. Submitted work must be original and must not be plagiarized. If I notice that you have submitted someone else's work and presented it as your own, copied your answers from other exam papers or plagiarized from a published article, I will inform the administration about this issue regardless of your performance in other portions of the course. Plagiarism will not be tolerated and will result in an F for the assignment and possible suspension from the university. I will hate to do that, but there will be no exceptions to this rule. 





3	Progress report II: Revised version of the Proposal after the Research Symposium.  Date: November 25, 2022	All students submit their research proposals. The content of the proposals may vary but should contain the following:  Title, the problem under investigation, history of the research problem, rationale for the study, hypotheses and objectives of the study, theoretical and practical implications of the study, research methods (including description of prospective participants, instruments and procedures).  Proposal must contain a paragraph which explains how your research design complies with APA Ethical Standards.
4	IRB Application form submission – in November, December 2022.	It is students' responsibility to prepare and fill out application form to be submitted for the IRB' review, according to the IRB Review Schedule.
5	Progress report III: Data collection Date: February 15, 2023	Students report on their data collection and submit detailed statistical analysis of data and the raw data and computer analysis output.
6	Progress report IV: Date: March 10, 2023	Students submit to the Department the first drafts of their theses formatted in accordance with APA style.
7	Mock Defense. Date: April 1-5, 2023	Students present final version of their theses. Supervisors report on their assessment of the progress of the students and their preparedness for the Defense.
8	Final versions submission. Date: April 30, 2023	Students submit their <u>final projects</u> . Late projects are subject to a mandatory and substantial grade penalty. On the project due date, students must submit the bounded copy as well.
9	Defense	Date TBA (preliminary scheduled for mid-May).
